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

Who we are and where we work

The Global Fund is -

- an international financing institution
- dedicated to attracting and disbursing significant resources to prevent and treat HIV and AIDS, TB and malaria
- promotes partnerships between governments, civil society, the private sector and affected communities
- relies on country ownership and performance-based funding

We work –

- in all regions of the world, with grants in over 140 countries
- raising funds since the GF's creation and by end 2013, a projected cumulative total of about US\$ 28.3 billion will have been mobilized by the GF
- and channelling funds where the need is greatest 85% of GF financing is directed towards low and lower-middle income countries with high burden of the three diseases
















GF portfolio overview



















Achievements in the past decade

- In its 10 years' existence, the Global Fund has brought treatment and prevention to millions of people. The most recent results to end 2013 show continued increases in the last year in HIV, TB and malaria prevention and treatment:
 - 6 million people currently receiving antiretroviral (ARV) therapy to treat HIV, from 50'000 in 2000
 - 11.2 million new smear-positive TB cases detected and treated
 - 359 million insecticide treated nets were distributed to protect families from malaria.
- The world has moved from a mood of despair in the face of unstoppable pandemics to one of genuine hope that they can actually be defeated.
- From 2005 to 2011, AIDS-related mortality decreased by 24 percent.
- HIV transmission rates are falling in nearly every region, including the worst affected countries. Where treatment is available, the death rate is also falling.















The Global Fund investments in Asia

- Australia is supporting the Global Fund since 2004 to address these lifethreatening diseases in the world's poorest countries.
- The Global Fund is currently supporting 127 grants in 27 countries in the region. This amounts to current commitments of USD 3.2 billion for the fight against HIV, TB and malaria, as well as for strengthening health systems. The total cumulative committed amount of funding for HIV is USD 2,34 billion and for HIV/TB USD 14,8 million.
- By mid-2013, the Global Fund contributed to achieving the following results: 710,000 people currently on ART; ARVs for the prevention of mother-to child transmission for 100,000 HIV positive pregnant women; 74 million HIV counseling and testing encounters, distribution of 470 million condoms and treatment for HIV and TB for 1,7 million people infected with HIV and TB
- Under the new funding model, countries in Asia/Pacific can expect the continued commitment of the Global Fund to achieve impact in the fight against HIV/AIDS.

- We cannot do it alone it's a shared endeavor




